The audio we've just heard is an extract from a podcast which aired on the National Public Radio in December 2022. It deals with the development of the AI named ChatGPT, a software program which can do a wide range of tasks. The journalist and his guest agree on the fact that it might be **more** effective **than** us, humans, for some work.

According to them, teenagers are particularly interested in ChatGPT, have it on their phones and **might** use it at school, without the teachers knowing. Thus, this type of AI poses an ethical problem. The professor hints that we do not realise the consequences of something like ChatGPT, that they are **more profound than** we **might** think. He asserts the AI **is going to** replace humans. The extract ends on the scientist claiming we don't really know what the future **will be**. *Are* artificial intelligence programs **going** to do our homework? *Are* they **going** to replace teachers? And **should** they?...
